

Naomi

Naomi Campbell (b. 1970) is the leading fashion model of our time. After four decades in the industry, today Campbell continues to feature in prominent catwalk shows, ad campaigns and fashion shoots.

This revelatory and personal exhibition will explore Campbell's illustrious career drawing upon her own wardrobe, along with stunning loans from designer archives, beautiful fashion photography and film. The installation will encourage close examination of the best of high fashion, including designs by Alexander McQueen, Azzedine Alaïa, Chanel, Gianni Versace, Jean Paul Gaultier, John Galliano, Karl Lagerfeld, Kenneth Ize, Dolce & Gabbana, Vivienne Westwood, Valentino, Virgil Abloh and many more.

An exemplar in her field, Campbell has transcended the role of model. Moving beyond the realm of fashion, the exhibition will also explore her contributions to music and media, and her powerful work as an activist and creative change maker.

Produced in collaboration with Naomi, her voice will be threaded throughout, experienced through emotive AV installations and quotations. Contributions from collaborators and friends, including a photography installation curated by editor-in-chief of British *Vogue*, Edward Enninful, will also bring in key industry voices.



Part 1: Supermodel

Scouted as a teenager on the streets of London in the 1980s Naomi rapidly gained international recognition as a leading model. One of the original 'supermodels', she made headlines when in 1987, aged 17, she became the first Black model on the cover of French *Vogue*.

Part 2: Muse

A creative collaborator, Campbell quickly transcended the role of a passive modeler of fashion to become a muse and active contributor in the design process. She built lasting, important relationships with top designers like Azzedine Alaïa (1935–2017) and houses like Versace and Dior.



Part 3: Brand Builder

Campbell uses her high profile to promote fashion and related products for numerous brands. Some of these commercial partnerships, and friendships, have stretched across decades. Her loyalty and image have helped to define the brand identities of many design houses.

Part 4: Cultural Leader

Throughout her career Campbell has used her platform to highlight important issues such as equity in the fashion industry and beyond. She champions emerging African creatives including model Adut Akech and designer Kenneth Ize and has collaborated with musicians such as Michael Jackson and Beyoncé.

Part 5: The Catwalk

The exhibition's crescendo, the catwalk will feature a dazzling array of key designs from across Naomi's career, from stunning McQueen gowns to stylish tailoring by Virgil Abloh for Off-White.
