JMW TURNER'S LIFE AND WORKS



Introduction



JMW Turner has been described as the first truly modern British painter. His work has been linked to the Romantic movement, which swept across Europe in the late 18th and early 19th Centuries and his late works, in particular their seeming abandonment of form and use of strong, bold colours, has been associated with the rise of Impressionism in the 1870s. Yet, when he died in 1851 his work was widely ridiculed and criticised in the press and his behaviour was described as erratic and eccentric.

Join us on this study day as we trace the irregular trajectory of Turner's life and work.

Turner was an artist of incredible breadth and range who was a master in oils, watercolour and prints. This study day will explore how Turner was constantly experimenting to find ways to convey emotions through his work. On this year, the 250th anniversary of his birth, we will look at Turner's works in the V&A's collection, as well as others, to investigate what made this artist special.
