

Artist Roo Dhissou hosts Gurmat Sangeet Academy for a live music set that activates *Heal, Home, Hmmm*. Experience live kirtan and short introductions to Sikh string instruments, the Dilruba, Taus, Esraj, Sarangi and the Tabla and Jori, through demonstrations, stories and shared listening.

Gurmat Sangeet Academy is a community school of Sikh sacred music, guided by Dr Harjinder Singh Lallie. Today's performance features Ustad Surjeet Singh, a UK-based Sarangi player.

A student of Pundit Ram Narayan Ji, the first internationally successful sarangi player, he has also been trained in Dilruba by Ustad Gurdev Singh and the late Ustad Harbhajan Singh Ji.

Central to Qualeasha Wood's artistic practice are themes of glitch art, body horror, and consumerism, expressed through video, tapestry and performance. In Attention Economy, Wood will enact the state of "bed rotting"a phenomenon where prolonged rest blends with digital overstimulation-providing a commentary on how selfhood and identity are increasingly shaped online by technology and situating the Black femme body as a site of both spectacle and exploitation, particularly within digital economies.

Artist Jakkai Siributr's textile installation *There's No Place* explores concepts of identity, belonging, and home, inspired by his personal attempt to reckon with the ongoing refugee situation on the Thai-Burma border. The long-term collaborative embroidery project creates dialogues between the displaced ethnic Shan communities in Thailand and viewers around the world.

Emerging Designer Commission: Heal, Home, Hmmm - Roo Dhissou Sculpture, Room 25

For the V&A's annual Emerging Designer Commission, artist Roo Dhissou created a pavilion inspired by traditional cob building techniques from the Punjab region of India, made using clay excavated for the HS2 trainline works near Ealing. The project explores how access, care, and environmental responsibility can shape the structures we build, both physically and socially. A sound installation presented inside the structure meditates on the artist's own experience, as a disabled person, of unfit housing.

Marking his European debut, this display features seven of artist Ryunosuke Okazaki's latest wearable creations. inspired by sculptural pottery of Japan's Jomon period (c.14,500 to 300 BC). Born and raised in Hiroshima. where the atomic bomb was dropped in 1945, he channels his aspirations for peace into futuristic garments. Each work expresses the power of prayer as a force that connects the past and the present as well as humans and nature.
