### **About Marie Antoinette Style Exhibition**

Immerse yourself in Marie Antoinette's lavish lifestyle through 250 objects including pieces on loan never seen outside of Versailles and France. From sparkling jewellery, silk slippers, to pastel gowns, and an array of wigs, the exhibition also includes work by contemporary designers Dior, Moschino, Chanel, Erdem, Vivienne Westwood, Valentino, and Manolo Blahnik, that speaks to Marie Antoinette's enduring aesthetic and legacy long after her death in 1793 as a result of the French Revolution.

# Black Presence in 18th-Century France: Classism, Freedom, and Identity

Our guest speaker for the afternoon segment is the **celebrated historian and distinguished Research Professor Dr Olivette Otele** who will explore the experiences of African and Caribbean descendants in 18th-century France, focusing on their legal status under the Code Noir and their public representation within elite circles. We examine codes of behaviour especially through fashion, the military, politics, and the arts, and their associations with figures such as Marie Antoinette, the Duc of Orléans, and the Freemasons.

We shall reflect on France's role in transatlantic enslavement and political upheaval, and how these shaped the Black elite across the Atlantic and their involvement in the abolition. Discover individual stories of the Chevalier de Saint-Georges, Alexandre Dumas, Josephine Bonaparte, Toussaint L'ouverture, Jacques Dessalines, King of Haiti Henri Christophe, Vincent Ogee and other influencing figures who fought against or supported the abolition. The session reveals lives of creativity, resistance, and influence.

## **Biographies**

**Dr Sarah Grant** is Senior Curator of Prints in the Department of Art, Architecture, Photography & Design at the V&A, and curator of the exhibition *Marie Antoinette Style*. She first joined the museum in 2006 as Assistant Curator of Textiles and Dress. Her research and publications focus on Marie Antoinette, as well as 18th-century French portraits, prints, and textiles. Sarah has curated displays on Matisse, Dalí, and Warhol, alongside exhibitions exploring 18th-century fashion plates and caricatures.

Dr Olivette Otele is a distinguished Research Professor of the Legacies and Memory of Slavery at SOAS, University of London. She holds a PhD from La Sorbonne and is a former Vice President of the Royal Historical Society. Olivette has received an honorary degree from Concordia University, Canada, served as a judge for the International Booker Prize, and held a visiting chair at the Collège de France. A regular contributor to the press and broadcaster, she has written extensively on the histories of people of African descent. Her book African Europeans was shortlisted for the LA Times Book Prize in 2022. Olivette also advises policymakers, private companies, and NGOs including the Welsh Government and *The Guardian* on colonial history and restorative justice.
